Commentary on the Television Show Paranormal State Paranormal Research Society (PRS)

PRS Assumptions

Ghosts are most active at 3:00 a.m., known as "dead time."

Candles are necessary during "dead time" sessions because ghosts seek warmth and light.

Three a.m. is "dead time" because ghosts are mocking the time that Jesus died in the afternoon.

Another Perspective

Think of all the dead people you know. How many of them would be mostly active or only active at 3:00 a.m.?

How many of them could you gather in one place at the same time at any time of the day or night?

If ghosts seek warmth and light, why would they be most active at cold 3:00 a.m.?

Why would ghosts seek warmth and light if they like to hang out in cold, dark places? (See the *Ghost Hunters* PDF file at the website below.)

Wouldn't ghosts find more warmth from a heated house or summer day than from three candles on a table?

Wouldn't ghosts find more light from sunlight during the day than from three candles at night?

What about ghosts who as humans were Muslim or Hindu or Buddhist or members of any other religion around the world? Would they appear only at 3:00 a.m. to mock the time someone from a different religion died?

Note that PRS on Paranormal State had entirely different experiences from TAP on Ghost Hunters. The members of TAP rarely find any activity they are willing to say is paranormal. PRS regularly found demons. Ryan Buell, director of PRS, played the hero quite often on his series. He and his team rescued people from demons. At the end of one episode, Ryan even lifted the damsel in distress in his arms. Ryan also asked the world to pray for that victim. Ryan even portrayed himself as a tragic hero because he had a demon following him.

The PRS team brought in priests to do exorcisms. The team had to do two exorcisms for the family mentioned above. If that victim was haunted by a demon, why would the power of God in the first exorcism fail to keep the demon away?
